RED PANDA CUBS EXPLORING HABITAT

NORFOLK, Va. – Virginia Zoo visitors now have a good opportunity to see the red panda cubs exploring their habitat.

Initially, mother Bernadette would carry cubs Charlie and Thomas by the scruff of the neck, but by the first week of October, the pair began exploring their habitat independently at night. Since Columbus Day, the cubs have been frequently spotted outside during visiting hours.

"Everyone's very excited to see them out and about," said Greg Bockheim, the Zoo's executive director. "We hope Charlie and Thomas will inspire visitors to learn more about these entertaining creatures and the challenges they face in the wild." He noted that red pandas are part of the Species Survival Plan programs, a cooperative effort by members of the Association of Zoos and Aquariums to preserve endangered and threatened animals through cooperative breeding, research, education and reintroduction efforts.

The red panda cubs, born June 20, are among several babies recently born at the Zoo. Kellen, a baby giraffe born June 6, is beginning training with keepers. The cassowary chick born June 11, whose sex still has not been determined, continues to develop under father Boris' care. An owl monkey born July 24, whose sex has also yet to be determined, can usually be spotted on his dad's back, but is becoming more independent. Lola, the baby siamang, turned 1 year old August 20 and has begun eating more solid foods and now nurses only a little.

Red pandas are small tree-dwelling animals native to the eastern Himalayas and southwestern China. Slightly larger than a domestic cat and with markings similar to a raccoon, red pandas have soft, dense reddish-brown and white fur that covers their entire body.
