Spring At Last!

Spring has sprung and this season your visit to the Virginia Zoo includes enhanced guest and animal features. For starters, the entire boardwalk path through Asia - Trail of the Tiger is being replaced with a sustainable composite material and handrail that adds "polish" to the area and enhances viewing into animal habitats. Looking further into 2023, the new cinereous vulture aviary will give you an up-close experience with these large and curious birds. They are one of the world's heaviest flying birds with the biggest beak in its family. The new Turtle Oasis is our nationally recognized conservation project that will immerse you into a series of streams and pools occupied by North America's largest and smallest freshwater turtle species. The smallest weighs less than 5 ounces and is only 4 inches in length and the largest more than 24 inches long and weighing more than 50 pounds. We are very excited to share these new Zoo experiences with you.

Along with the new animal habitats are a few new animal residents. We were delighted by the birth of baby male siamang Lovejoy, affectionately known as Lojo by his Keepers. He will be venturing outside for the first time this spring with his parents. And, you will soon see our newest education animal ambassador, Sanibel, the bald eagle. She's still "wearing" her juvenile feathering, so we will all get to watch as she grows into her regal adult plumage which takes several years.

Thank you to all of you for being Zoo fans and sharing your Zoo experience photos with us. You inspire the entire Zoo team when we see you enjoying your outing at the Zoo learning about our animal residents, taking in the sprouting gardens, and sharing time with family and friends. We look forward to bringing you more "Zoo" this summer.

Staff is working on a larger habitat for a new male and two female McCord's **box turtles** who have an SSP breeding recommendation.



Some of our Nigerian dwarf goats were impregnated using artificial insemination (AI). AI was chosen over natural breeding due the increased husbandry needs and limited goat yard space for a male goat. Goats usually have 1-2 kids per mom.



Mosi, the juvenile Southern white **rhino**, is back out with the whole herd and doing well after a recent injury to his horn in early January. Horn injuries like this are not uncommon, especially in juveniles, as their horns are still developing.

A bundle of (Love)joy! Born to mother, Malana, and father, Bali, baby was observed nursing, alert, and clinging to Malana's belly. Siamang gestation was approximately seven and a half months.



July-August 2022

Baby's first teeth! **Lovejoy's** incisors begin coming in on the top and bottom. He is observed trying to reach for food items, discovering his hands and fingers, and trying to sit up on his own.



September 2022

On the move! **Lovejoy** begins grabbing onto the climbing ropes and meshing to stand up or move around.



October 2022

Mama's boy! **Lovejoy** is observed climbing on top of Malana and sitting away from her, as well. Siamang pairs stick together and raise their offspring as a family unit. Infants like Lovejoy often cling to their mother's belly for the first several months before gradually becoming more independent.



While still nursing, **Lovejoy** is observed eating some solid foods. He also tests boundaries by climbing up the mesh on his own but generally prefers to stay close to Malana. Unlike most other primate species, adult male siamangs will assist with raising offspring. Typically, the adult male takes on a larger role when the infant is a year or older.



Gaining some independence! He is climbing more independently and observed moving further away from Malana. Keepers have also noticed his vocal sac trying to inflate while yawning. Siamangs communicate through vocalizations, including "barks" and "booms". They have inflatable throat sacs that aid in amplifying their calls.



In **Lovejoy's** future, he will begin to become more active, independently climbing away from mom and dad. He will interact with enrichment and his environment and begin play behavior with Bali. With the late spring re-opening of Asia: Trail of the Tiger, **Lovejoy**, Malana, and Bali will be back out on Siamang Island.


Zoo Volunteers Utilize Community Science for Conservation Engagement.



The Virginia Zoo mission beats strong at the core of our volunteer programs: engaging our community in taking action to save the world's wildlife and their ecosystems. Conservation science, habitat protection and restoration, and sustainable solutions for everyday actions depend on whole communities of individuals coming together, and we are excited to facilitate this through volunteer opportunities. This year, our Zoo Crew, Conservation Youth Team (CYT), and Episodic volunteers can look forward to getting involved in a number of community science initiatives at the Zoo and beyond – and we're welcoming everybody to get on board!

This spring, Virginia Zoo volunteers will be assisting with the set-up and kick-off of our participation in two familiar community science projects: Frog Watch USA (a long-standing national survey of amphibians now organized by Akron Zoo) and Caterpillars Count! (a national project using arthropod surveys to study phenology led by researchers at University of North Carolina). Over the summer, volunteers of all ages will have the opportunity to join our staff for evening frog surveys at a variety of locations around Hampton Roads, and Zoo Crew and CYTs will be leading our on-site data collection of caterpillars and other insects. As fall approaches, butterfly fans can be on the lookout for Monarch Watch tagging opportunities on site, and new and experienced birders alike will be valuable assets as we work to add a few winter opportunities to our lineup.

Each community science project we participate in provides real, tangible ways for our volunteers to contribute to conservation science. If you're interested in getting involved, Zoo Crew applicants can look forward to intake in April and June to get involved this spring and summer, and Episodic volunteers can keep a lookout in your email for Frog Watch opportunities starting in March! Together, we have the power to save wildlife and their habitats. We hope you'll join us!









Asia: Trail of the Tiger Highlights

In mid-November of 2022, the Virginia Zoo closed the Trail of the Tiger for demolition and reconstruction of the elevated walkway. The trail opened in April of 2011, had become deteriorated and needed a refresh.

The \$2MM project is managed under the watchful eye of City of Norfolk Project & Construction Management Division and working closely with project General Contractors E.T. Gresham. The renovation consists of full demo of boardwalk planks, railings, and joists. An inspection of support pilings was completed, and 36 pilings are being replaced followed by complete replacement of wood preservative treated lumber joists and composite decking. The project will install AZEK TimberTek decking planks which have a lifespan of 20 years and are moisture resistant. They also resist heat better than wood materials. The new

decking is environmentally sustainable made from approximately 90% recycled material.

A second project happening simultaneously during this time frame is replacing roofing at the entrance to the Trail of the Tiger at the Orangutan outside observation area and on the suspended Trail near the Orangutan indoor exhibit.

Throughout the project, the welfare of the animal residents in the 5.5 acres of the Trail of the Tiger, has been our top priority. Prior to the start of construction, contractors were trained on welfare and safety expectations working around the exhibits. The Zoo also moved the red pandas, rhinoceros hornbill, sarus crane and birds housed in the Asia aviaries to temporary holding areas off the trail. The Asia Keeper team has been closely

monitoring all animals on the trail for any signs of stress related to the construction and continue to update Zoo leadership and project leadership of any concerns so that adjustments can be made if necessary.

The Zoo kept some of our Asia animal residents on-exhibit during construction.

These animals include tigers, orangutans, cassowary, moon bear, otters, and gibbons. However, many of these animals are tropical or sub-tropical species and typically have access to indoor, off-exhibit parts of their habitats during the colder winter months every year, so they may have choosen to be inside some. The project is expected to be completed by summer and the Virginia Zoo is looking forward to a grand opening celebration.

An up-close look at our extraordinary Zoo Vet team and Ruuxa, our Hartmann's mountain zebra

Zebras need nail care, too! Zebra hooves are similar to a domestic horse's in that the hoof walls grow continuously, just like our human nails.

Ruuxa, our six-year-old Hartmann's mountain zebra, went in for a routine preventative health examination in December. The Zoo Vet Team called for assistance from Kim Burnop, a local farrier who has expertise in the trimming of horse hooves. Proper care of the hooves helps avoid hoof overgrowth, which can cause hoofstock to develop lameness or hoof infections. Since zebra are wild animals, this exam required Ruuxa to undergo general anesthesia so that our Vet Team could perform the procedure safely.

Since her last exam in May last year, Ruuxa's hooves showed great improvement. She also received routine wellness and preventative care such as a physical exam, blood work, dental care, and vaccines. Our Zoo Vet Team is dedicated to quality animal care and continue monitoring the health of our animals.

- The national bird of the United States, bald eagles are found throughout North America. The Virginia Zoo is home to two of these magnificent birds, Abe (male) and Sanibel (female).
- Suvenile bald eagles differ from adults in that they lack the distinctive snowy white head, neck, and tail. Instead, young bald eagles, like Sanibel, are a bottled brown with white blotches. Sanibel will be one year old in April but won't develop her adult coloration until around five years old. Abe is a mature adult believed to have hatched in 1990, making him approximately 33 years old.
- Solution Bald eagles have an average lifespan of 20-30 years in the wild but can live 50 years or more in human care.
- Semale bald eagles are typically larger than males, but individuals in the North tend to be larger than those from the South. Sanibel, named for the Florida island where she was rescued, weighs approximately 3.5 kilograms (7.7 lbs). She will likely remain around this size as she reaches adulthood.





Like other raptors, bald eagles have sharp claws designed for piercing and holding onto prey.



- So both Abe and Sanibel came to the Virginia Zoo as rescued bald eagles who were deemed non-releasable. Abe has been at the zoo since 1992! Bald eagles are a federally protected species, but they are a great example of conservation success as their populations continue to rebound − almost quadrupling in the last decade alone!
- The Virginia Zoo is pleased to provide a permanent home for both birds. Abe can be found along the North America trail. Sanibel currently lives behind-the-scenes with our other education ambassador animals. We hope she'll make her appearance during Education programs and Zoo-wide events later this spring!

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What's Growing On?

Our horticultural technicians are hard at work cold stratifying and scouring seeds for our annual plant sale which will occur in conjunction with our Party for the Planet event, happening May 20th from 10am-2pm. In addition to crowd favorites like the Senna alata, or Candle bush, whose bright yellow inflorescences will fill our tropical beds come spring, this year the Horticulture department will also have a variety of Virginia natives and pollinator friendly plants available to take home and add to your garden ecosystem. Planting natives in your own garden helps us in our mission to build sustainable ecosystems in order to protect native wildlife. Come check out our sale and take the opportunity to talk to our team who will be available to give you care instructions and planting tips for your new plant additions!

Species to be featured in our plant sale:

- Grasses are often the overlooked hero of a garden ecosystem. Grasses provide shelter, and nesting material to many living things. Sporobolus heterolepis, a species of grass native to West Central Virginia, is often chosen for its neat ornamental characteristic. Also known as Prairie Dropseed this grass is an important shelter species to overwintering native bees and a larval host for the three subspecies of Leonard's skipper moths.
- Hibiscus laevis, is our native species of Hibiscus, also known as Rose mallow. Each flower bud opens and lasts for a single day and in that time attract a number of bees, including the solitary ground dwelling Rose Mallow bee. As a bonus, Rose mallow, and many other hibiscus species, are a great snack for our sloths!
- We will have numerous other species available for all of the pollinators in your life, zinnias, celosias cosmos, and so much more, we'll see you there!

On September 5, 2022, Dr. Lauren Novak joined the Virginia Zoo as our very first veterinary intern. Interns in the Zoo veterinary field have a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine (DVM) degree and are provided a unique opportunity for clinical and professional growth within a supportive environment that focuses on high quality medical care, guest education, and herd health and wellness. This one-year training position focuses on improving clinical competency with zoological species and to prepare for a position in a zoological institution. There is no one path to becoming a zoo veterinarian, but an internship provides individuals with one route for entering the field and provides early career zoo veterinarians the opportunity to expand their clinical and taxonomic experience under the guidance of an experienced zoo veterinarian. Having Dr. Lauren on staff has allowed us to expand our preventive care practice as well as increase the number of procedures the vet team has been able to schedule in front of the public.
