



When the Virginia Zoo's second-ever Southern white rhinoceros calf was born in November 2023, our Africa: Okavango Delta trail keepers saw an opportunity to highlight conservation work happening in the calf's native territory. They named her after Sergeant Nkateko Letti Mzimba, a ranger with **The Black Mambas**, the first all-female, anti-poaching organization in South Africa. Sgt. Mzimba was recently named 2023's Best Field Ranger in Africa for her passionate efforts to protect rhinos and other wildlife species, as well as her work to educate surrounding communities on the importance of wildlife conservation.

Craig Spencer, biodiversity manager for the Black Mambas' parent organization, Transfrontier Africa, said the Mambas' overall goal is to ensure all megafauna complete their entire natural lifecycle without becoming victim to poachers, and they work day and night to protect the rhinos and other wildlife living in Kruger National Park from human threats.

Letti's keepers hope the meaning behind her name will bring awareness to the Black Mambas and other organizations doing on-the-ground work to protect wildlife in Africa, while inspiring young women to chase their passions and stand up for what they believe in. If you'd like to support the Mambas, they say one of the biggest ways you can alleviate roadblocks to their work is through donations, but spreading awareness about their efforts through mediums like social media is also a significant way to make a difference.

Read on to learn more about some of the organizations we support through our Act for Wildlife conservation fund:

For over 10 years, the Virginia Zoo has proudly supported many wildlife conservation organizations such as the Tiger Conservation Campaign out of the Minnesota Zoo, the International Rhino Foundation, the Hornbill Research Foundation and the Turtle Survival Alliance. Other organizations the Virginia Zoo supports include Action for Cheetahs in Kenya, the Red Panda Network, the North American Bird Conservation Initiative and the Giraffe Conservation Foundation. Recently, the Zoo has begun supporting several additional organizations:

Pride Lion Conservation Alliance

The Pride Lion Conservation Alliance, also known as the Pride Alliance, launched out of the Houston Zoo in 2015 with a goal of establishing a new, collaborative approach to lion conservation.

Members are using their collective experience as leaders, influencers, strategists and on-the-ground field conservationists with a solutionsfocused approach to halt the decline of lion populations.

According to the Pride Alliance, the wild African lion population has decreased nearly 90% in recent decades, and their range has shrunk dramatically. Today, nearly half of their range is in unprotected, residential areas. The Pride Alliance engages thousands of people each year to address the biggest threats to lions and improve the lives of local people. Their programs include human-lion conflict prevention, snaring and poisoning mitigation, applied research and monitoring of lion populations, veterinary care support and more.





Vulture Conservation Foundation

The Vulture Conservation Foundation strives to recover Europe's four vulture species populations by initiating, facilitating and supporting conservation actions and research by collaborating with governments, businesses, local communities, wildlife-focused NGOs and people. Vultures face threats to their survival including illegal wildlife poisoning, habitat loss, reduced food availability and collisions with infrastructure. The Vulture Conservation Foundation's work seeks to help Europe's vulture populations become self-sustaining, healthy and able to occupy most of their natural ranges while being valued by all.




Greening World

CREATURE FEATURE

PREHENSILE-TAILED PORCUPINE

Introducing Dimitri, the prehensile-tailed porcupine, with the most boopable nose in the Zoo. Named for their impressive tail that accounts for 9% of their body weight, this little guy uses his muscular appendage to grab branches and explore the rainforests of South America. As a nocturnal rodent, he spends his nights foraging for food in different trees and using his long whiskers to feel around in the darkness. At the Virginia Zoo, Dimitri is an Animal Ambassador living in our Program Animal Building behind the scenes. His purpose at the Zoo is to educate the public on his counterparts in the wild. Get the chance to meet Dimitri at one of our ZooLive! Stage shows or with our Animal Ambassador Behind-the-Scenes tours.

The prehensile-tailed porcupine's quills are short, barbed, and easily detachable, allowing them to embed their quills into predators. They can also raise their quills to appear bigger, revealing their yellow-toned body that serves as a sign of danger to any predators. This incredible defense and their ability to climb trees has allowed them to adapt as a rodent species with one of the longest life spans of up to 15 years.

Snacking is Dimitri's specialty! At the Zoo, his diet consists of vegetables, rodent chow, fruit and browse, but the canned primate biscuit is one of his favorites. Another favorite is nuts! Dimitri is offered large nuts several times a week and munching on these helps to maintain his constantly growing teeth. His keepers use his diet as reinforcement during training sessions. Dimitri is trained in several behaviors such as "kennel", "target", and "perch" which help with his presentations at Zoo programs. He is currently learning "shake" which is a natural behavior for Dimitri.

AMBASSADOR - Animal ambassadors represent their animal counterparts in the wild.

CONSERVATION - The careful maintenance and upkeep of a natural resource to prevent it from disappearing.

ECOSYSTEM - A group of living organisms that live in and interact with each other in a specific environment.

HABITAT - The natural home or environment of an animal.

HERBIVORE - An animal that feeds on plants.

MAMMAL - Any warm blooded animal typically characterized by the possession of hair or fur.

NOCTURNAL - An animal that is most active at night.

PORCUPINE - Large rodents with coats of sharp spines that protect them.

PREHENSILE - An animal's limb or tail that is capable of grasping.

SPECIES - A group of living organisms consisting of similar individuals capable of exchanging genes.

WILDLIFE - The native animals of a region.

ZOOKEEPER - An individual that cares for animals in a zoo.

Enrichment. What is it?

With over 700 individual animals at the Virginia Zoo, our care goes beyond just physical health. Enrichment is a way to mentally and physically stimulate our animals in a way that mimics their natural behaviors. This means animal enrichment can come in many different forms.



What does it mean to be enriching to the animals?

Enriching our animals' lives means providing them with the opportunities to make natural choices as they would in the wild. Enrichment is designed with the goal of increasing the animal's behavioral choices and drawing out speciesappropriate behaviors.



How do you decide on enrichment?

All enrichment here at the Zoo goes through a rigorous planning and approval process. Keeper and vet staff review proposed enrichment to ensure that it is safe and purposeful then observe and document the results. Documentation and evaluation are done to determine the effectiveness of the enrichment.







Where do you get enrichment?

As enrichment means different things to different animals, there are a variety of objects that can be deemed enrichment for our animals. This means that our enrichment is acquired from different sources. Some of our enrichment is purchased from companies that specifically make zoo animal enrichment, while other times we buy dog toys, such as KONG and crinkle toys, that can be used for our animals. Another option for enrichment is building our own using materials such as cardboard, construction paper, and streamers. All enrichment the Zoo creates is carefully designed to be safe and create valuable experiences for our animals. This form of enrichment is created by staff and volunteers alike for different purposes throughout the year.

The Five Categories

Enrichment falls into 5 main categories: social, cognitive, physical, sensory, and food. On a basic level, these are objects, scents, habitat features, food, or anything else that can provide physical and/or mental stimulation for the animal. One example of physical enrichment is the climbing structures included in certain habitats like red panda, moon bear, orangutan, siamang, and gibbon. These structures are each built with the individual species in mind to promote natural climbing/exploring behaviors. Puzzle feeders are used with many animals to provide both nutritional and cognitive enrichment. Additionally, different stimuli like sounds and scents are used as a type of sensory enrichment.


Serpentine Sangria
